The move comes after FedEx mishandled a couple of deliveries for Huawei, and failed to deliver a Huawei smartphone shipped from Britain to the United States.</p>
<p>Huawei's US Research Arm Futurewei Said to Be Building a Separate Identity <b>Gadgets 360</b></p>	<p>The US-based research arm of China's Huawei Technologies - Futurewei Technologies - has moved to <a href="#">separate its operations</a> from its corporate parent. Futurewei has banned Huawei employees from its offices, moved Futurewei employees to a new IT system and forbidden them from using the Huawei name or logo in communications.</p>

The move could reshape global manufacturing and further fan tensions between the countries.</p>
<p>Trump Pressured by Congress to Stay Tough on Huawei in Xi Summit <b>Bloomberg</b></p>	<p>President Donald Trump faces growing bipartisan pressure in Congress to maintain a <a href="#">hard line on Huawei</a> (PayWall) Technologies Co. rather than ease restrictions on the telecom company to cut a trade deal later this week with Chinese leader Xi Jinping.</p>
<p>US chipmakers are reportedly quietly lobbying to ease Huawei ban <b>CNBC</b></p>	<p>Huawei's American chip suppliers, including Qualcomm and Intel, are quietly pressing the U.S. government to ease its ban on sales to the Chinese tech giant. Executives from top U.S. chipmakers Intel and Xilinx attended a meeting in late May with the Commerce Department to discuss a response to <a href="#">Huawei's placement</a> on the black list.</p>
